## October Is "WALKtober" Month! Join Alameda CTC and Safe Routes to Schools in kicking off International Walk and Roll to School Day on Wednesday, October 8, 2014

Alameda County - California. The <u>Alameda County Transportation Commission</u> (Alameda CTC) and the Alameda County <u>Safe Routes to Schools</u> (SR2S) program are urging families in Alameda County to take part in <u>International Walk and Roll to School Day</u> on Wednesday, October 8.

Although the official kickoff is on the 8th, <u>127 Alameda County schools will participate</u> in a variety of activities and events throughout the entire month of October. "WALKtober" encourages parents to leave the car at home, enabling kids to walk, bike or roll to school.

**MEDIA OPPORTUNITY:** On Wednesday, October 8th, Alameda CTC Chair, County Supervisor Scott Haggerty will join school kids at Dougherty Elementary School in Dublin at 8 a.m. to celebrate International Walk and Roll Day. Many other Alameda County and local elected officials will also join in the walk-and-roll festivities throughout the county.

In celebration of WALKtober, Alameda County's Safe Routes to Schools program is awarding four participating schools with brand new bike racks: Frederiksen Elementary School in Dublin, Nea Community Learning Center School in Alameda, Oliveira Elementary School in Fremont and San Lorenzo High School in San Lorenzo. These bike rack awards are based on demonstrated need and SR2S program performance.

The Alameda County Safe Routes to Schools program has been advocating for active, healthy kids since 2006. The program has expanded across all areas of Alameda County, making it one of the most active SR2S programs in the nation. With continued funding, the Safe Routes to Schools program will reach even more schools, create safe-family friendly bicycle and pedestrian paths, teach kids and families the basics of walking and biking safely, fund school crossing guards and continue to deliver more carpooling and transit programs to reduce traffic around schools.
