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Thousands of Students to Walk & Roll to School on October 4

More than 150 Alameda County schools to participate in International Walk and Roll to School Day on Wednesday, October 4

ALAMEDA COUNTY, Calif. Each year more Alameda County students join the fun and enjoy the benefits of taking a healthy route to school by walking, riding, scooting or sharing their ride on International Walk and Roll to School Day. This year the marquee celebration is scheduled for Wednesday, October 4, although several schools will be celebrating on a different day in October. Alameda County's Safe Routes to Schools Program supports this annual event at schools throughout the county to promote active and shared commutes to school.

"International Walk and Roll to School Day is an important event, both for public health, and for reducing traffic congestion and improving our environment," says Alameda CTC Chair Rebecca Kaplan, Oakland City Councilmember At-Large. "Walking and biking are healthy habits for our kids and our community. We know that students do better in school when they are more physically active, and these efforts also reduce congestion and air pollution. We hope that people will use this week as an opportunity to try new ways to get to school, and help improve lives for both themselves and their neighborhoods."

Those families who live far from school are encouraged to try transit, coordinate a carpool, or to park a few blocks away from school and walk there together.

International Walk and Roll to School Day is in the middle of the region's <u>Share Your Ride Week</u>, which is promoting "skip the traffic, hop on transit, or hop on a carpool app." More information is available at <u>Rideshare.511.org</u>.

Alameda CTC administers the county's Safe Routes to Schools Program and provides the majority of its funding through the voter approved transportation sales taxes Measure B and Measure BB.

The <u>BikeMobile</u>, a mobile bicycle repair clinic that is part of the Alameda County Safe Routes to Schools program, will participate in events all week, repairing bikes for free and providing free bike safety and repair training. See the <u>BikeMobile's calendar here</u>. Up to 50 percent of Alameda County's students do not ride their bikes due to minor issues, such as a flat tire or worn out brakes. The BikeMobile addresses this problem by bringing mechanics directly to students.
