On April 27 the Alameda County Transportation Commission unanimously approved the <u>2018 Comprehensive</u> <u>Investment Plan</u>, programming \$405 million over five years that supports a diverse portfolio of local project and program priorities. This investment funds all transportation modes, state of good repair, safety and the closure of infrastructure gaps.

"Alameda CTC is delivering on our promises - providing critical funding for a wide range of local transit, bike, pedestrian, highway and infrastructure improvement priorities," said Alameda CTC Chair Rebecca Kaplan.

Alameda CTC's investments in all modes helps increase daily transportation choices, and we encourage you to try different modes for your commute. Since <u>May is Bike Month</u>, try biking this month - even just once. This Thursday, May 11th is <u>Bike to Work Day</u> and <u>Bike to School Day</u> throughout the Bay Area.


New Carpooling Options

2018 Comprehensive Investment Plan

\$405 million in transportation improvements

Approved in April 2017, the <u>2018 Comprehensive Investment Plan</u> (CIP) has a five-year programming horizon and a two-year allocation plan that includes federal, state, regional and local transportation fund sources administered by Alameda CTC, such as voter-approved Measure B and Measure BB dollars. It leverages nearly \$2.8 billion of additional funding, leading to a total investment of \$3.2 billion worth of transportation improvements in various stages of development throughout Alameda County.


"The CIP was developed through a project nomination process that ensures we are investing in local priorities," said Executive Director Arthur L. Dao. "By funding projects in various stages of development on a five-year horizon, we ensure that we are preparing a pipeline of projects for delivery and to be competitive when additional funding becomes available, whether at the regional, state or federal level."

May is Bike Month

See you in the bike lane!



Here is information to get you started:

- Pledge to bike to work on May 11th!
- Find an Energizer Station that's on your route to work (for refreshments, Bike to Work Day bags, support and high-fives!)
- Sign up for Team Bike Challenge and log your miles. Compete with friends and other offices. Here is a **toolkit** to help get your colleagues riding.
- Want to brush up on your skills and improve your confidence on a bike? Take an Urban Cycling Class.
- Not a cyclist? Become one take an Adult Learn-to-Ride Class.
- Remember bikes are welcome on transit. You can also store your bike in a secure on-demand **BikeLink locker** at many BART stations, train depots and park-and-ride lots.
- Sign up here for one of several Family Cycling Workshops this month.

Alameda CTC has invested significantly in bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure and safety improvements throughout Alameda County, and we can see the results with smoother pavement, safer streets, more bike lanes and fewer system gaps. Measure BB doubled the direct local distribution amounts that each city in Alameda County receives monthly to support bicycle and pedestrian projects, and the 2018 CIP (see above) is also funding a number of bike/ped projects, including the expansion of Bay Area Bike Share.

Keep your eyes out for our IBike ads on buses, trains and bus shelters throughout the county, reminding you to bike for health, for fun, for the environment, and for VIP parking.



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Don't Forget to Carpool Instead!

Alameda CTC is continuing to promote carpooling, letting people know about new technologies that are making carpooling and ride sharing much easier through our Carpool Instead campaign. Schedule one-way carpool trips as either a driver or a passenger with carpool apps. Try the 511 RideMatch Service that allows you to find and email neighbors with similar commutes, or one of the carpool apps available at <u>Rideshare.511.org</u>. Use promo code ALAMEDA05 for \$5 off your first ride using any of the apps, and let us know if you are interested in receiving information on commute choices and carpooling incentives for your business.

Remember, commuters who carpool to the Dublin/Pleasanton Station with the Scoop app are guaranteed parking until 10 a.m. The app verifies two or more people were in the car when parked, and Scoop coordinates with BART police to verify which vehicles belong to Scoop users. This pilot program will be expanding to other BART stations later in the year. <u>Learn</u> more.

Wheels pilot program supports first- and last-mile trips in

Dublin

The Livermore Amador Valley Transit Authority, operator of the Wheels bus system in the Tri-Valley, has launched a pilot with Uber, Lyft and De Soto cab to provide discounted rideshare trips in the city of Dublin. The Go Dublin pilot, offering a discount of half the rideshare fare up to \$5, is the first partnership of its kind in the Bay Area. Go Dublin was designed as a more cost-efficient way to provide first- and last-mile connections to BART, Rapid bus service on Dublin Boulevard and other Wheels bus routes.
