


• 1906: Model T created

• 1916: Zoning for separation of land uses, bank funding trends follow


• 1930's: Streetcar and rail lines removed

Transit-Oriented Development Zoning




21nd Century: Back to the Future

- Attempts to reintroduce fixed transit and specialized bus service
- Use of Priority Development Areas as a way to focus planning and funding


Citywide "P" Development Areas

Work Underway Now



- Align City Policies with TOD goals;
 implement policies already on the books
 - Energy and Climate Action Plan
 - City CEQA guidelines' reform
 - Transportation Impact Fee
 - TDM as a standard condition of approval
 - Infrastructure gap analysis: ABAG growth;
 Public vs. Private funding



Getting The Big House in Order



- TOD-TAP grant received
 - Prepare Countywide Plan list, public and Council review
 - Focus on one or two PDAs as pilots Develo interdepartmental process for prioritization
 - City criteria and implementation practices
- Applied for \$1M Sustainable Communities Grant
 - Actively develop TODs with all Agencies that support Oakland – BART, AC Transit, Alameda County Public Health Department, MTC, ABAG, ACTC, Policylink
