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### Student Transit Pass Pilot Program Goals

- Reduce transportation access barriers to and from schools
- Improve transportation options for Alameda County's middle and high school students
- Build support for transit in Alameda County
- Develop effective three-year pilot programs
- Create a basis for a countywide student transit pass program (funding permitting)

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#### Student Transit Pass Pilot

- May 2016 Commission approval
  - Distinct pilot programs in each planning area – passes distributed at 9 schools
  - Shortlist of 36 schools for potential expansion
  - Alameda CTC to enter into agreements and contracts to implement Year 1 program
  - \$15 million allocated for pilot program over 3 years



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# Student Transit Pass Pilot Program – Year One (1 of 2)

- North County
  - Free and universal AC Transit passes for all grades at two Oakland high schools and one middle school (Castlemont High, Fremont High, Frick Middle)
  - Education only program (REALM Middle and High Schools)
- Central County
  - Free AC Transit passes available to 8th -10th graders
  - One high school and one middle school (San Leandro High and John Muir Middle)

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# Student Transit Pass Pilot Program – Year One (2 of 2)

- South County
  - 50% discounted AC Transit and/or Union City Transit passes available to 8<sup>th</sup> -10<sup>th</sup> graders
  - One high school and one middle school (James Logan High and Cesar Chavez Middle)
- East County
  - 50% discounted LAVTA/Wheels passes for all grades
  - Free passes for free/reduced-price meal (FRPM) eligible students
  - One high school and one middle school (Livermore High and East Avenue Middle)

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## **Program Evaluation**

• Framework approved by Commission in March 2016



18 quantitative and qualitative measures to evaluate performance, including:

- Student perception of transit options and barriers
- Student transit ridership
- Pass penetration and ease of use
- After school activity participation
- Participant, student attendance
- Program cost per participant and administrative costs

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## **Preliminary Findings**

- August through December 2016
- Initial analysis draws on:
  - Data reported from transit agencies
  - Information tracked by the school program administrators
  - The first student survey

All students at participating schools were encouraged to participate in online/paper survey regarding:

- Student perception of transportation barriers
- Transportation costs to families
- Program participation and usage
- BART usage by students

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






#### Participating Students - Key findings

- Top uses of Passes:
  - 1. Almost 70% use the pass to travel to and from school
  - 2. Afterschool activities
  - 3. Spending time with friends.
- Top reasons program participants don't use Passes more often
  - Participants prefer to travel other ways
  - Traveling by bus takes too long
- More than half of participating students said that the cost savings provided by the program was important.

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
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#### Non-Participating Students

- Top reason non-participants haven't registered:
  - Prefer to travel another way/bus doesn't meet my needs
- Many students said that they would register for the program if they were eligible.
  - In the Central County program, 78% of students who are NOT currently eligible said they would "definitely register" if the pass were made available.

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#### Comments from Students

- "Thanks for giving the student pass [for] free, it's help[ing] my family and me too."
- "The pilot program seems very excellent to me since it has helped me and
  my family to have a safe way for me to get to school and get my education.
  It's a program that has helped a lot of students and for my part I am very
  grateful."
- You should keep doing this, it helps a lot of us with money issues."
- "Thank you for this program it is allowing me to be more independent."
- "I like the transit pass and it keeps me from having to look for money each
  day of the week that I ride the bus. It is convenient and I ride 5 days a
  week."
- "It is a good idea to encourage public transit, because it is better for the environment."
- "Everything is good about the transit pass and I started not being late to school which make a positive dramatic change on my grades and willingness to go to school."

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
