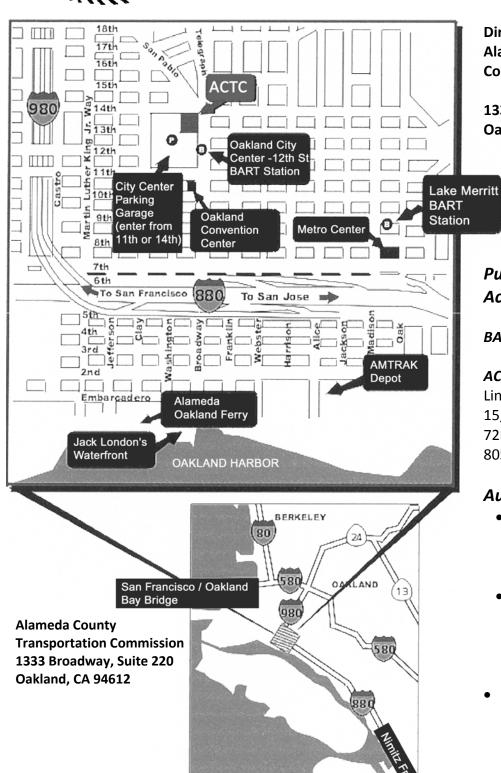

FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE MINUTES OF MARCH 12, 2012 OAKLAND, CA

Chair John Chiang convened the meeting at 1:35 PM.

1 Public Comment

There was no public comment.

2 Consent calendar

2A. Minutes of March 12, 2012

Supervisor Haggerty motioned to approve the Consent Calendar. Councilmember Kaplan seconded the motion. The Consent Calendar was passed 7-0.

3 Financial Matters

3A. Approval of a Proposed Update to the Fiscal Year 2011- 2012 Consolidated Budget for the Alameda CTC

Patricia Reavey recommended that the Commission approve the Proposed Update to the Consolidated Budget for FY2011-12. Ms. Reavey informed the Committee that this proposed budget is being brought to the commission to reflect changes in projects and programs needs since the original budget was developed and to reflect how actual revenues and expenditures are being realized as the year progresses.

The budget update includes revenues and expenditures necessary for vital programs and planning projects including the Countywide Transportation Plan, Congestion management Programs, Safe Routes to School Program, Vehicle Registration Fee Programs, the Transportation For Clean Air Program and Measure B pass through funding programs. The budget update also includes revenues and expenditures necessary to fund and deliver significant capital projects including the I-880 to Route 238 East-West Connector Project, Route 238 Mission-Foothill-Jackson Corridor Improvements Project in Hayward, BART Warm Springs Extension Project, BART Oakland Airport Connector Project, Route 84 Expressway Project in Livermore, I-880 North Safety & Operational Improvements Project at 23rd & 29th Avenues in Oakland, I-80 Integrated Corridor Mobility Project, and the Isabel-Route 84/I-580 Interchange.

Some of the efficiencies realized in the budget include the savings of \$1 million in salaries as well as almost \$2 million of savings from annual renewed contracts. She highlighted that the budget update, like the original budget, has been segregated by fund type and has revenues totaling \$179.4 million with 58% attributed to sales tax. She also mentioned that \$301.8 million of FY2011-12 actual year-end fund balances were rolled forward to include total available resources of \$481.2 million. Total expenditures in the budget update are \$325.8 million, for a net reduction in fund balance of \$146.4 million, projecting a consolidated ending fund balance of \$155.4 million. Ms. Reavey summarized by highlighting adjustments to revenues and expenditures in the budget update by fund type.

Ms. Reavey concluded by stating that the budget update provides additional resources of \$8.6 million and authorizes additional expenditures of \$44.2 million reflecting an overall decrease in fund balance of \$35.7 million for a projected ending fund balance of \$155.4 million.

Councilmember Kaplan motioned to approve this Item. Mayor Green seconded the motion. The motion passed 8-0.

4 Administrative Matters

4A. Approval of the Semi-Annual Contract Equity Utilization Report and Contract Award Report for July 1, 2011 through December 31, 2011

Tess Lengyel recommended that the Commission approve the attached Semi-Annual Local Business Contract Equity (LBCE) Program Utilization Report and Contract Award Report, for the period of July 1, 2011 to December 31, 2011. She informed the Committee that there were a total of 36 active contracts with LBCE Program goals and 62 active contracts without LBCE Program goals. For the period of July 1, 2011 through December 31, 2011, the Alameda CTC awarded fourteen contracts for engineering services and six construction contracts for a combined total of over \$86 million. As of February 16, 2012, there were a total of 272 LBEs certified with the Commission.

Councilmember Kaplan motioned to approve this Item. Vice Mayor Bonta seconded the motion. The motion passed 8-0.

5. Contracts and Agreements

5A. Update on the Procurement of the Independent Financial Audit Services Contract and Related Activities

Seung Cho updated the Commission on the Procurement of the Independent Financial Audit Services Contract. He highlighted the RFP process, including results from the pre-proposal meeting, and the interview process. Vavrinek, Trine, Day & Company, LLP (VTD) was selected as the top-ranked firm. The cost of the VTD contract will be \$72,500 for the ACCMA, ACTIA and Alameda CTC fiscal year 2011-12 audits, \$65,500 for the Alameda CTC fiscal year 2012-13 audit, and \$68,500 for the Alameda CTC fiscal year 2013-14 audit. The cost for the Sunol Smart Carpool Lane JPA will be \$5,000 for fiscal year 2011-12, \$4,500 for fiscal year 2012-13, and \$4,500 for fiscal year 2013-14.

This Item was for information only.

5B. Approval of Amendment No. 1 to the Professional Services Agreement with Moffatt & Nichol (A11-0018) for Additional and Deferred Project Management and Delivery Services

Arun Goel recommended that the Commission approve Amendment No. 1 to the professional services agreement with Moffatt & Nichol (M&N) to increase the agreement budget in the not-to-exceed amount of \$775,000. He informed the Committee that the amendment is needed due to major changes to the agency project delivery management staff and the ramp up in State Infrastructure Bond funded projects. The amendment to the M&N agreement of \$775,000 will be funded with \$250,000 of unexpended contract budget from FY2010-11, and the balance of \$525,000 will be funded with capital funds through various project grants and Measure B capital project funds.

Councilmember Kaplan questioned if we considered doing the described work in-house. Art Dao informed the Committee that there was not enough in-house project delivery staff to complete the level of work needed for these projects.

Director McPartland motioned to approve this Item. Councilmember Kaplan seconded the motion. The motion passed 8-0.

5C. Approval of MIG Contract Amendment

Tess Lengyel recommended that the Commission approve an amendment to the existing Moore Iacofano Goltsman Inc. (MIG Communications) contract in the not-to-exceed amount of \$60,000. The amendment is to add to staffing capabilities for additional communications and outreach services required through the end of June, 2012. The current contract amount is \$350,140 and approval of the amendment would bring the contract to the new total amount of \$410,140.

Director McPartland motioned to approve this Item. Councilmember Kaplan seconded the request. The motion passed 8-0.

6. Committee Member Reports

Councilmember Kaplan informed the Committee that the City of Oakland unanimously voted in favor of the TEP.

7 Staff Reports

Art Dao informed the Committee that the upcoming March 28, 2012 CTC Meeting reception in Dublin would be sponsored and hosted by Alameda CTC.

Lend \$5 Million to ACCMA

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Commission approve a loan in the amount of \$5 million from ACTA to the ACCMA in compliance with the loan program approved in March, 2011, increasing the total loan amount to \$10 million. This loan is necessary in order to support the ACCMA's cash flow needs in relation to the capital improvement program.

Summary

The ACCMA receives reimbursement from various funding sources including granting agencies to fund the capital improvement program. However, these funds are received on a reimbursement basis. Frequently there is a lag in the reimbursement of funds due to funding agency issues. Because the cash flow issue is due to timing on funding, the cash flow need does not compound from year to year, but is based on project activity throughout each fiscal year. The ACCMA must bridge the cash flow gap while waiting for reimbursement from granting agencies in order to remain solvent.

The ACCMA was originally established to administer and monitor the Congestion Management Program which included mainly planning and programming activities such as county-wide transportation planning as well as funding, programming and allocating funds for capital projects in Alameda County. Over the years, the ACCMA has incorporated the project delivery function into its business model, beyond the core functions of planning and programming. However, the ACCMA's original funding sources were not designed to cash flow large capital projects. This has left the ACCMA in a very tight cash flow position as various capital projects ramp up to construction phase incurring significant costs on an ongoing basis.

Discussion and Background

The Loan Program was designed to address the emergency cash flow situation the ACCMA was facing last year. Based on analysis of ACTA cash flows, it is expected that the ACTA can lend up to \$25 million from the 1986 Measure B Transportation Sales Tax Program to the ACCMA while continuing to deliver the projects designated in the original 1986 Measure B Transportation Expenditure Plan.

Staff implemented the Loan Program last year with an initial loan of \$5 million. The ACCMA is required to repay ACTA the principal balance when it is in a position to do so, which is expected to be in 2015 when their capital improvement program is expected to wind down. The ACCMA may repay the loan, in whole or in part, at any time without penalty. Per the approved Loan Program, additional funds may be loaned, as needed, by ACTA to the ACCMA with the approval of the Commission. Based on current cash flow projections, ACTA will have funds available to cash flow the ACCMA's cash flow need throughout the life of the current capital improvement program.

Fiscal Impacts:

There is no net impact to the Alameda CTC budget for the approval of this item, and the fiscal impact of the loan due to lost return on investment for ACTA would be negligible.

Recommendations:

It is recommended that the Commission approve the attached member agency fee schedule for FY2012-13 to support the Alameda County Transportation Commission (Alameda CTC) core functions.

Summary:

Pursuant to the provisions of the JPA dated March 25, 2010 which created the Alameda CTC, the Alameda CTC is required to adopt an annual budget by June 30 of each year for the succeeding year. However, the Alameda County Congestion Management Agency (ACCMA) has historically adopted the member agencies fee schedule prior to this date with the intent of providing the cities and County of Alameda with the member agency fee schedule for use in developing their respective budgets.

The member agency fee schedule attached for FY2012-13 reflects a 6 percent increase over the fee for FY2011-12 which is the same as the increase rate from last year and a decrease from the growth rate employed over the last few years.

Discussion:

The recommended member agency fee schedule for FY2012-13 reflects a 6 percent growth rate over the total FY2011-12 fee that was adopted by the Alameda CTC Board last year in March, 2011. The allocation between the Cities and the County have been updated to reflect fiscal year 2010-2011 actual proposition 111 subvention allocations which is the most current year of data available from the State Controller. Member agency fees are an essential funding source for the Alameda CTC in order fund vital services and to provide the local match required for available funding sources on many of the agency's planning projects.

Fiscal Impact:

Approval of the recommended fee schedule will set the Alameda CTC's FY2012-13 revenue budget for member agency fees at \$1,394,819 which will be incorporated into the Alameda CTC's consolidated budget scheduled for approval in June, 2012.
