
### Alameda Countywide Transportation Plan (CWTP) 2012

- Identifies transportation needs & priorities
- 25-year horizon
- Many funding sources
- Guides eligibility for regional funding
- Updated every 4 years



## How a project gets funded

- Projects flow up through system
  - Iterative
- Every transportation project must be listed in Plan to get funding
- Region programs money either for State or Federal funds




### Transportation Expenditure Plan (TEP)

- Currently: "Measure B"
  - ½ cent sales tax
  - Passed by voters 1986
  - Reauthorized 2000
  - Valid 2002-2022
- Revenue Split:
  - 60% Programs
  - 40% Capital Projects

The TEP describes how ONE FUNDING SOURCE will be spent.






- 1 Capital Projects, 40%
- 2 Local Streets and Roads, 22%
- 3 Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety, 5%
- 4 Special Transportation for Seniors and People with Disabilities, 10.5%
- Mass Transit, 22%


### Current Measure B Shortfall

### Measure B Revenue Forecasts:


- □ Original......\$2.9 million

  - Capital Projects shortfall: (\$300 million)






### Declining state gas tax revenue




