The City started the update process for both the Bicycle Plan and Pedestrian Plan, to combine them into one Active Transportation Plan (ATP), in late 2019. After approx. 12 months of delay due to the pandemic, work resumed in Spring 2022. A draft plan was released in October 2022 and is expected to be adopted by December 2022. Project web page: www.ActiveAlameda.org.

1b. Describe which how your bike/pedestrian master plan is being implemented in the reporting fiscal year i.e. which projects being implemented and transportation benefits/needs addressed.

Central Ave Safety Project - Project creates all ages & abilities facility by adding separated bike lanes to Central Ave, and bike lanes in other sections, per the City's draft ATP. It also makes safety improvements by implementing a road diet and adding three roundabouts, and other pedestrian crossing improvements. Made significant progress on plans toward 65% PSE completion.

Clement Ave Cross Alameda Trail (CAT) from Grand to Broadway - Project creates all ages & abilities facility by adding separated bike lanes to Clement Ave and widens sub-standard sidewalks and adds crossing improvements, implementing both plans. Completed environmental phase and 65% PSE in reporting FY.

Clement/Tilden Project - Concept planning and outreach began on this project that will add a roundabout, multi-use paths and separated bike lanes, to connect the Cross Alameda Trail project to the Miller-Sweeney Bridge.

Oakland-Alameda Estuary Crossing - City released an RFP for PID phase services for this new bicycle/pedestrian connection between Oakland and Alameda, which is in the City's draft ATP.

Grand Street from Shoreline to Encinal - City developed concept plans for separated bike lanes (upgraded from standard bike lanes) plus pedestrian crossing improvements - 2 RRFBs, curb ramp upgrades, striped bulb-outs. These projects are included in the draft ATP.

2. Describe how your reported DLD expenditures specifically addressed safety.

<u>Capital</u>: The Central Ave and Clement Ave projects are both projects designed to improve safety for people walking and bicycling, using FHWA-proven countermeasures.

<u>Planning work</u> on the SR2S capital improvements is designed to make it safer to walk and bike to school. The concept developed for the Stargell Ave from Main to Fifth grant application will create a shared use trail where there are only sharrows on a high speed street, and also slow traffic and improve pedestrian crossings. The citywide study of roundabouts will move the City towards implementing this highly effective safety countermeasure for intersections. The Lincoln/Marshall/Pacific corridor project is specifically designed to improve safety along this High Injury Corridor.

Education: Bicycle safety education class teach safe riding skills to youth.
