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## The Independent Watchdog Committee Issues its 21st Annual Report to the Public Regarding Measure B and Measure BB Sales Tax Measures

ALAMEDA COUNTY, Calif. – On July 13, 2023, the Independent Watchdog Committee (IWC) of the Alameda County Transportation Commission (Alameda CTC) approved its 21st Annual Report to the Public https://www.AlamedaCTC.org/IWC2023Report/, covering fiscal year 2021-2022 expenditures and IWC activities. The report makes recommendations regarding the delivery of projects and programs funded by Measure B, Alameda County's half-cent sales tax for transportation improvements, and those funded by Measure BB, which augmented the half-cent sales tax to one cent and extended the tax through 2045.

Each year, the IWC reviews and analyzes Alameda CTC's Measure B and Measure BB expenditures to ensure that funds are spent in accordance with the voter-approved measures. For additional detail, see the full report at the link provided above.

In fiscal year 2021-2022, Alameda CTC received \$144.1 million in Measure B revenue and expended \$112.5 million as follows:

- \$41.7 million for public transit, including operations, capital investments and special transportation for seniors and people with disabilities.
- \$38.5 million for local transportation improvements, including local streets and roads and bicycle and pedestrian projects.
- \$26.5 million for debt repayment.
- \$2.3 million for highway and street capital projects.
- \$2.3 million for general administration.
- \$1.2 million for direct program and project management and oversight.

Alameda CTC issued \$137.1 million of Measure B Sales Tax Revenue Bonds in March 2014 to bridge a shortterm funding gap that existed while many large capital projects included in the 2000 Measure B Transportation Expenditure Plan were in construction. During FY2021-22 the bonds incurred \$26.5 million of costs related to annual debt repayment including the final debt service payment to pay off the bonds which was made in March 2022. In fiscal year 2021-2022, Alameda CTC received \$241.8 million in Measure BB revenue and expended \$248.5 million as follows:

- \$86.2 million for highway and street capital projects.
- \$78.3 million for public transit, including operations, capital investments and special transportation for seniors and people with disabilities.
- \$76.2 million for local transportation improvements, including local streets and roads and bicycle and pedestrian projects.
- \$3.8 million for general administration.
- \$3.4 million for direct program and project management and oversight.
- \$0.6 million for other grants including technology and community development grants.

In July 2015, the IWC replaced and assumed responsibility for the Citizens Watchdog Committee created in 2002 after reauthorization of the local sales tax measure in 2000. Each year, the IWC reports directly to the public on the agency's Measure B expenditures and Measure BB expenditures and performance measures.

### About the Alameda County Transportation Commission

Alameda CTC plans, funds and delivers transportation programs and projects that expand access and improve mobility to foster a vibrant and livable Alameda County. Alameda CTC coordinates countywide transportation planning and delivers the expenditure plan for the Measure B sales tax approved by 81.5 percent of county voters in 2000 and the expenditure plan for Measure BB, approved by more than 70 percent of voters in November 2014. #### About the Alameda CTC Independent Watchdog Committee

The IWC is made up of 17 members, all of whom must be a resident of Alameda County. IWC members are not elected officials at any level of government, nor individuals in a position to benefit personally in any way from the sales tax.

IWC at-large members are appointed for a two-year term, including:

- One per district, appointed by the Board of Supervisors.
- One per district, appointed by the Alameda County Mayor's Conference.

All other members may serve until a replacement is appointed, including:

- One per representing organization specified in the Measure B and Measure BB Expenditure Plans:

  - Alameda County Paratransit Advisory and Planning Committee
  - Alameda County Taxpayers' Association
