



The 2022 Alameda Active Transportation Plan includes priority ("near term") programs (see Table 9) and a "2030 Infrastructure Plan" (see Table 10). All of the projects and programs that were being developed and/or implemented in FY 22/23 are included in one of these tables. CAPITAL PROJECTS (# are from Table 10, ATP):

(#1) Central Ave Safety Project -- Project creates all ages & abilities facility by adding separated bike lanes to Central Ave, and bike lanes in other sections, per the City's draft ATP. It also makes safety improvements by implementing a road diet and adding three roundabouts, and other pedestrian crossing improvements. Made significant progress on plans toward 100% PSE completion.

(#2) Grand Street from Shoreline to Encinal -- City approved concept plans for separated two-way bike lanes (upgraded from standard bike lanes) plus pedestrian crossing improvements - 2 RRFBs, curb ramp upgrades, striped bulb-outs.

(#3) Clement Ave Cross Alameda Trail (CAT) from Grand to Broadway -- Project creates all ages & abilities facility by adding separated bike lanes to Clement Ave and widens sub-standard sidewalks and adds crossing improvements, implementing both plans. Completed 100% PSE in reporting FY. (#3) Clement/Tilden Project -- Concept planning and outreach were completed in reporting FY. Project will add a roundabout, multi-use paths and separated bike lanes, to connect the Cross Alameda Trail project to the Miller-Sweeney Bridge.

(#4 and 5) -- Park St and Webster St will be restriped to add bike lanes, which is the initial phase of improvements to these streets. Concept plans were developed and approved in reporting FY.

(#8) Oakland-Alameda Estuary Crossing -- Stakeholder involvement and PID phase were advanced for this new bicycle/pedestrian connection between Oakland and Alameda, to create a safe and comfortable crossing between the west end of Alameda and Oakland, where none exists. (#9) Estuary Water Shuttle -- A new water shuttle between the west end of Alameda and the Jack London Square area in Oakland will create a safe and comfortable near term walking/biking connection, where none exists. ACTC grant was awarded and great strides were made in planning the service, to start in 2024.

The Central Ave and Clement Ave projects are both projects designed to improve safety for people walking and bicycling, using FHWA-proven countermeasures.

Planning work on the SR2S capital improvements is designed to make it safer to walk and bike to school. PROGRAMS:

Vision Zero Action Plan implementation including developing and implementing a rapid response to severe/fatal collisions program, communicating safety messaging to the commuity, is focussed specially on improving safety for vulnerable users. Bicycle safety education classes and safe routes events and workshops teach safe riding skills to youth.
