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The Independent Watchdog Committee Releases 23rd Annual Report to the Public on Measure B and Measure BB Sales Tax Expenditures and Committee Activities

ALAMEDA COUNTY, Calif. – On July 17, 2025, the Independent Watchdog Committee (IWC) of the **Alameda County Transportation Commission** (Alameda CTC) approved its 23rd Annual Report to the Public https://www.AlamedaCTC.org/IWC2025Report, covering fiscal year 2023-2024 expenditures and IWC activities. The report makes recommendations regarding the delivery of projects and programs funded by Measure B, Alameda County's half-cent sales tax for transportation improvements, and those funded by Measure BB, which augmented the half-cent sales tax to one cent and extended the tax through 2045.

Each year, the IWC reviews and analyzes Alameda CTC's Measure B and Measure BB expenditures from the prior year and reports to the public about whether funds were spent in accordance with the voter-approved measures. For additional details, see the full report at the link provided above.

For fiscal year 2023-2024, Alameda CTC received \$382.7 million in Measure BB revenue and expended \$371.8 million as follows:

- \$135.3 million for highway and street capital projects
- \$109.2 million for public transit, including operations, capital investments and special transportation for older adults and people with disabilities
- \$102.4 million for local transportation improvements, including local streets and roads and bicycle and pedestrian projects
- \$9.0 million for debt repayment
- \$5.4 million for direct program and project management and oversight
- \$4.4 million for other grants including technology and community development grants
- \$4.3 million for general administration
- \$1.8 million for freight and economic development grants

In July 2022, Alameda CTC issued \$124.0 million of Measure BB Sales Tax Revenue Bonds to bridge a short-term funding gap that existed while many large capital projects in the Transportation Expenditure Plan were entering the construction phase. In fiscal year 2023-24, the bonds incurred \$9.0 million of costs related to

annual debt repayment. Details related to the debt can be found in the official statement: AlamedaCTC.org/Bonds.

For fiscal year 2023-2024, Alameda CTC received \$1.1 million in Measure B revenue from prior year collection adjustments. Audited expenditures for the period totaled \$17.4 million mostly related to highway and street capital projects.

In July 2015, the IWC replaced and assumed responsibility for the Citizens Watchdog Committee created in 2002 after reauthorization of the local sales tax measure in 2000. Each year, the IWC reports directly to the public on the agency's Measure B expenditures and Measure BB expenditures and performance measures.

Governed by a 22-member Commission, Alameda CTC manages the county's one-cent transportation sales tax and serves as the county's congestion management agency. The agency delivers more than \$300 million each year in transportation improvements that create jobs, enhance mobility and enrich communities.

About the Alameda CTC Independent Watchdog Committee

The IWC is made up of 17 members, all of whom must be a resident of Alameda County. IWC members are not elected officials at any level of government, nor individuals in a position to benefit personally in any way from the sales tax.

IWC at-large members are appointed for a two-year term, including:

- One per district, appointed by the Board of Supervisors.
- One per district, appointed by the Alameda County Mayor's Conference.

All other members may serve until a replacement is appointed, including:

- One per representing organization specified in the Measure B and Measure BB Expenditure Plans:
 - o Alameda County Labor Council
 - o Alameda County Paratransit Advisory and Planning Committee
 - o Alameda County Taxpayers' Association
 - Bike East Bay
 - o East Bay Economic Development Alliance
